## Mission Trip Fundraising Update

Thank you to all for donating cookies/treats for the Cookie Sale we held last Sunday. We raised \$600.00! Nice work! We now have raised \$4385.73 for our trip. The Southwest Association for the United Church of Christ is giving us a \$500.00 grant so this will give us \$4885.73.

We need to raise about \$7,000 to cover the expenses of our trip. So our next big event: BRATFEST! Bratfest runs over Memorial Day weekend, May 24-26. If we can fill 55 shifts we will make about \$2,000. Last year with the church's help we filled about 35 shifts. **I'm asking that this year each youth going on the trip, try and work 2 shifts.** Each shift is about 3 to 3 1/2 hours. With most of the youth working and parents/siblings and other folks from the congregation, I think we can fill 55 shifts.

If we do this, we will have raised almost all the money we need for our trip. Please let me know if you will not be able to work at Bratfest because of extenuating circumstances. You can also ask someone else to fill in for you.

## Boydseye View

We continue through Lent looking at "signposts" of spiritual vitality. This Sunday we will focus on "healing." When it comes to the practice of healing prayer, I suspect many of us are like a friend of mine who contracted colon cancer about 7-8 years ago. He was under the care of a colon specialist and did the expected and necessary regimen of chemotherapy and radiation. At the same time, there were many people in his church who wanted to offer healing prayers and rituals of various forms. Someone came to perform Reike on him; another came and offered acupuncture. A third brought a group of Buddhists to do a sitting prayer with him. There were others than offered homeopathic teas and massage. Others simply wanted to lay their hands on him and pray. Our friend said at the time that he wasn't sure what he thought about all these offers and all these attempts at healing – but he was a willing guinea pig. "I'll try anything and I will welcome any good energy – because I am sure it won't hurt!"

When it comes to healing, we are both confused and hopeful.

In one sense, the ritual of a healing prayer is counter-intuitive to us – we see God as expressing Godself through science and medicine and the natural course of life. The healing miracles of the New Testament stories seem to come from a distant and pre-modern world. While we occasionally witness unusual and unexpected health "miracles" – we are not sure we believe in a God who intervenes in to alter our body's processes the natural course of things. At the same time, as human beings we often feel deep and irrepressible longings for health and wholeness. In both our personal health and our social well being as a people, we know pain, agony, and suffering. We know, in our bodies and our hearts, that much of the world is out of whack, out of sync, in desperate need of healing. We seek a deeper and stronger connection between ourselves and the created order around us.

It all prompts the question of what do we mean when we talk about healing? What is it we are seeking? Is it our own personal, physical, emotional, and spiritual healing? A corporate, global wholeness and shalom? Some combination of both?

This Sunday's Scripture from Luke describes the woman who believed so strongly in Jesus' healing powers that all she needed to do was touch the hem of his garment. After she felt herself healed, he blessed her by saying, "Go in peace".

As I read those words, I hear "Go in peace. Be peace. Offer the peace you know to those in need of it. Proclaim the peace of God to all who will hear it." It is a reminder that while the work of the Spirit in healing remains a mystery, the impact on our lives of praying for one another, laying our hands on one another in hopes of healing, is very real.

Wisconsin State Journal columnist Bill Wineke once wrote, "every time I prayed for my friend (who was having surgery), I was reminded how important she and her family have been to me. That was true, also, when I prayed for friends who later died. My prayers didn't "save" them, but they did draw me closer. When I pray for someone, I open myself to the possibility of ever-greater closeness, either in joy or in sorrow, to that person's life."

His words are a reminder that whatever else we know or can say about the laying on of hands, there is a fundamental and powerful component to healing of all kinds - community. In a community of faith, we acknowledge that we do not travel this life of faith alone - but find ways known and unknown to be with one another. I invite you to join in the ritual of healing this weekend in worship. I invite you to come full of hope, love, expectation and joy - for yourselves and for others in need of God's healing grace. By the way, my friend's colon was healed. But of course, that was only part of the point!
